Her classroom and research interests focus on problem-solving approaches to writing; she is also interested in how computer technology impacts instruction.

John Cohassey graduated from Oakland University with a B.A. in history in 1990, and received departmental honors for his paper “The Great Jazz Fire: Pioneer Jazzmen of the Twenties.” After earning an M.A. in history from Wayne State University, he co-authored the award-winning memoir of an African-American businessman, *Toast of the Town: The Life and Times of Sunnie Wilson* (WSU Press 1998). John has recently co-authored the manuscript *America’s Cultural Rebels: Artistic Avant-Gardes and Countercultures*, with Roy Kolynek, O.U. Professor Emeritus of American History.

John M. Finke received his B.A. in biochemistry from Claremont-McKenna College (1993), his M.S. in chemistry from University of California at San Diego (1998), and his Ph.D. in chemistry from the

University of California at San Diego (2001). From 2001–2005, he worked in the Department of Physics at UCSD as a National Institutes of Health Ruth Kirchstein Postdoctoral Fellow. John Finke joined the faculty in the Department of Chemistry at Oakland in 2005.

Sherman Folland is Professor of Economics and former editor of *The Oakland Journal*. He publishes numerous articles focusing on health economics. With two colleagues, he is also author of the leading textbook in that field, *The Economics of Health and Health Care*.

Alex Grant's chapbook, *Chains & Mirrors* (Harperprints) won the 2006 Randall Jarrell Poetry Prize and received the 2007 Oscar Arnold Young Award (best collection by a North Carolina poet.) He was the 2004 winner of WMSU's Pavel Srut Poetry Fellowship, and was one of fifty poets selected for Meridian's 2007 *Best New Poets* anthology. He has been a runner-up, honorable mention or finalist for The Lena-Miles Wever Todd Prize, Tupelo Press's Dorset Prize, The Tupelo Open, The Pablo Neruda Poetry Prize, The Felix Pollak and Brittingham Prizes, Discovery/The Nation, and The *Arts & Letters* Rumi Poetry Prize, among others, and his poems have recently appeared or are upcoming in many national publications. He lives in N.C., and divides his time between Chapel Hill and Carrboro, where he lives with his wife, his dangling participle and his Celtic fondness for excess.

Alice Horning is a Professor of Rhetoric and Linguistics and Director of the Rhetoric Program at Oakland. She teaches courses in composition and reading in Rhetoric and courses in the history of the English language, psycholinguistics and language acquisition for Linguistics. Her research focuses on the psycholinguistics of literacy.

Kasia Kietlinska was born and raised in Poland. She received her M.A. degree in English Language and Literature at the University of Gdansk, Poland (1978), and worked as an Assistant Professor at the University of Gdansk and as an ESL teacher, interpreter & press liaison for the Solidarity Trade Union. In 1983, came to the US as a political refugee. Kasia did graduate work in English at the University of Michigan in 1988, and since 1989 has been teaching a variety of composition courses at Oakland.

Stafford C. Rorke, D.Phil. (1992), MA (1985), is a Fellow of the American College of Sports Medicine and is currently Program Director in Wellness, Health Promotion, and Injury Prevention in the School of Health Sciences. His scholarly interests are in occupational work physiology, the prevention of acute or chronic illness, prevention of unintentional and intentional injury, and the development/implementation of task-specific physical readiness evaluations for people engaged in physically demanding occupations.
